The Institute has Management Information system which includes the following modules 1. Library Fully Automated with Library Management Automation Software Systems "LIBSYS 10" and "DSPACE" (Institutional Digital Repository Application Software). OPAC/Library Catalogue of the library can be searched with the aid of a computer. A large number of periodical indexes/abstracts, fulltext sources and statistical data sources are available for searching through Library management software i.e. LIBSYS installed in six computers that are located in the Main hall of the Library, For optimum retrieval of information through various eResources,</p>

a federated search engine i.e. EBSCO Discovery Service has been subscribed by the library which facilitates single point search for maximum results. The Access to ILI Digital Library is available in public domain and can be accessed free of cost through the following hyperlink : <http://www.elearn.ingilidelhi.org/ILIWEB/>. 2. Accounts and Finance : Accounts department maintained all its payrolls with the easy to use webbased Pay Plus software. Online payments under various heads are performed using online payment portal in collaboration with Bank of Baroda. 3. Online Admission Portal: The admission process for all the courses are done through online mode .The Institute is using the "Online Admission Portal" from M/s No paper forms, Delhi. This software is useful for receiving and managing the online applications for various courses i.e Ph.D., LL.M and PG Diploma Courses. 4. Off Campus Access: Institute has designed the software "Off Campus Access" for the use of library to access the subscribed eResources by the authorised users. 5. Legal Information Resource Centre (LIRC): The ILI has set up a Legal Information Resource Centre (LIRC) with latest technology computers, heavyduty printers and WiFi technology. The computers have been equipped with databases including SCC Online, Manupatra, The Laws, LexisIndia, West Law India, JSTOR, Hein Online, Taxmann, and EPW Online etc., Turnitin Software to check plagiarism.. 6. Indian Law Institute Digital Resources - To facilitate the legal research, the Institute has digitized various documents such as renowned ILI publications, rare documents, Journal of The Indian Law Institute from 1958 to 2016 (volume 1 to 57), Annual Survey of Indian Law from 1965 to 2015 (Volume 1 to 51), Index to Indian Legal Periodicals from 1963 to 2014 (volume 1 to 52), various Commission and committee reports, Federal Court Reports, Indian Law Reports Allahabad, Bombay, Calcutta, Lahore, Lucknow, Madras, Patna and Rangoon. To support all the work at the backend, the Institute maintains four Servers (i.e, Libsys Server, eshikshak, dspace and backup Server) used by the Faculty

students and administration. Institute also maintains the Cyber room, Web Server, Mail Server, Off campus access, NKN Router, Various Network Switches and Access Points to provide the ICT Facilities.

Feedback Obtained
<p>The Institute gets the feedback at student, faculty, alumni and other legal fraternity level. Students Level: The feedback is received from students in a format approved by the IQAC, on learning experience, syllabus covered, infrastructure ICT availability. The feedback of the students is also taken for infrastructure development, purchase of library books, learning (hard/soft) resources. The outcome of feedback analysis plays an important role in decision making. Faculty Level: The Institute identifies the areas of further improvement on the basis of recommendations made by faculty members, the Board of Studies and Centre for Post Graduate Legal Studies. The Institute revises the Academic and Examination regulations on the basis of feedback received from the faculty members and students. Faculty feedback on infrastructure, learning resources, library books/journals (Indian Foreign), learning softwares, is regularly taken and decision is taken based on the analysis of the feedback. Alumni Level: The Institution is working on institution of The Association of Indian Law Institute Alumni. One of the Alumni of the Institutes is members of IQAC and many are invited for special lectures and are providing continuous feedback about their experience in the institute and provide valuable and constructive opinion about possible improvement to get global visibility to the institute. The Teaching Learning Process in the ILI is predominantly student centric. Principally, Socratic method is followed wherein students can probe into the subject with questions and even the average student can assimilate the concept. ICT tools (like power point presentation, LCD Projectors etc) are employed in lecture delivery to promote clearer understanding of the concepts. ILI recognizes that students need constant support and mentoring and hence, has devised a mechanism which involves faculty and student peer group involvement. Structural and functional characteristics of student support and mentoring • The institute website provides all information to the students as well as to their parents about the activities which take place in the institute. • The institute has the facility of Intra-net to provide all relevant information about their academic and extracurricular

activities. • The online database links are provided on the intra-net. The students can also access them sitting anywhere in the institute. • Institute has further made arrangements of remedial classes for academically weaker students by way of individual or group classes depending on the nature of requirement. Students are encouraged to discuss relevant emerging issues and participate in conferences and seminars. Institute provides free Wi-Fi and on line resources. The students are assisted by provision of reading material and world class library support (ONLINE as well as OFFLINE). They are encouraged for participating in seminars/conferences and reading reference books, journals etc. to update their knowledge. Faculties discuss research papers and encourage them for research oriented education. Conferences/seminars/workshops/informative lectures are arranged and eminent academicians, legal experts, Supreme Court Judges, High Court Judges and scholars from different areas of law are invited to hold deliberations and discussions on different aspects of law Students are also encouraged to contribute to journals of good repute/UGC CARE Journals. A weekly 'Wednesday Seminar' is conducted to develop critical thinking and to enhance the knowledge as well as research skills of students.

Research and Development

ILI provides full support in terms of administrative and infrastructure facilities to enable faculty to take up projects. Faculty are engaged in active research by way of publication of books and articles in national international journals. The proceedings of National and International Conferences/ Seminars are routine work of ILI which educate the students as well as faculty. Various Ministries have been allocating projects to the Institute on contemporary issues and bindings of those studies are taken note by the Government. The Institute provides all the facilities to the faculties to conduct smooth research. They are

provided with separate chambers with ICT facilities. They are provided with the printing facilities, access to online databases. The researchers undertake research in their area of specialization with contemporary issues.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

Institute is equipped with one of the leading law libraries in Asia and attracts scholars from all over the World for legal research. The University Grants Commission has recognized the library as a place for legal research leading to doctorate degree in law and political science. The Institute provides all kinds of IT support through its dedicated IT Cell for maintaining various IP based eResources like Hein-Online, Westlaw India, JSTOR, Lexis Nexis, SCC online, Manupatra, Taxmann and various e-books. The Off Campus Access has been developed in-house and implemented for providing the access to various subscribed databases to authorized external users (viz., Judges of Supreme Court of India, various High Courts and various central institutions and law colleges). The Institute facilitated ICT from its very inception as a Deemed University in its academic activities as well as in administration. The Institute is equipped with learning facilitators and gadgets ranging from overhead projectors, slide projectors, Xerox machine, TV, Audio Player, Multimedia projectors and Multimedia ROMs, Computer labs.
