1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Indian Law Institute (ILI) was founded in 1956 primarily with the objective of promoting and conducting legal research. It was established as a result of the efforts of the leading jurists of India for over a number of years. There were many important reasons impelling the establishment of a national legal research centre. First, there was a need for reinvigorating legal research as the law, the legal research and the legal education had been neglected areas in India. Second, there was a need for a sustained institutionalized research encompassing projects requiring field studies and group thinking. Third, it was necessary to bring together different branches of the legal profession, with a view to develop an integrated approach to law in society.

The objectives of the Institute are to cultivate the science of law, to promote advanced studies and research in law so as to meet the social, economic and other needs of the Indian people, to promote systematization of law, to encourage and conduct investigations in legal and allied fields, to improve legal education, to impart instructions in law, and to publish studies, books, periodicals, etc.

The Institute is an autonomous body registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860.

Hon'ble Chief Justice of India is the ex-officio President of the Institute. The Law Minister of Government of India is its ex-officio Vice President. Judges of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India and High Courts, Lawyers, Government officials, Vice Chancellors, Deans and Professors of Law are represented in the Governing Council of the Institute.

The Indian Law Institute was granted Deemed University status in 2004 vide Government of India, Ministry of Human Resource Development Notification No.F.9-9/2001-U.3 dated 29.10.2004. Institute has been accredited with 'A' Grade (CGPA 3.35 out of 4.00) by NAAC in March 2017. After the visit and review by the UGC Expert Committee, the UGC approved the inclusion of Indian Law Institute u/s 12B of the UGC Act in June 2018. The Indian Law Institute was granted Grade II Autonomy by University Grants Commission on the basis of score accreditation.

Curricular Aspects

The primary goal of ILI is to cultivate and promote the science of law, which is guided by our guiding principles of constitutional justice, accessibility, and social justice. Aside from research, ILI is dedicated to developing a critical legal pedagogy in order to contribute to higher education in India and accomplish the goals of socially relevant legal education. ILI offers doctoral programmes and postgraduate courses as part of its commitment to the advancement of advanced legal studies. In order to provide better and wider exposure to the students, we organize special lectures by eminent scholars from India and abroad on a regular basis. Further, to foster the spirit of critical analysis and engagement with socio-legal challenges and to hone the academic acumen of students, the institute includes in its programme, student driven weekly seminars under the supervision of faculty members.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The principal method of teaching is Socratic Method where students probe into the subject with questions. In the classes, the lecture method is applied with the aim that average student will be able to assimilate the concept. Indian Law Institute follows interactive and lecturing method of teaching. Faculty members take special steps to ensure that each student take active part in classroom and research activities. The Institute follows Choice Based Credit System for evaluation purpose. ILI constructed its own building opposite to Supreme Court at Bhagwan Das Road, New Delhi on one and a half acre of land. The building has a magnificent structure, having four floors. The ground floor covers the Institute's Library, Conference Halls, Seminar and Class Rooms and chambers for the faculty, research scholars and administrative staff. All class rooms and halls are equipped with latest audio-visual gadgets and lighting arrangements needed for conducting seminars, training programmes and workshops in the Institute. The Institute made renovation of the lobby / reception area, main corridor, meeting room, atrium, mezzanine floor of the Library and terrace of the guest house.

The Institute provides all the facilities to the faculties to conduct smooth research. ILI has provided fully furnished independent faculty rooms to the faculties equipped with ICT facilities like computer, photocopiercum-printers, internet connection. ILI has subscribed many online legal databases which can be accessed by the faculties from their chambers. The researchers undertake research in their area of specialization with contemporary issues. ILI has a Legal Information & Resource Centre attached with its library. It has 8 computers with high end printers. Intercom facility has been provided in the offices of faculty and staff. The ILI has one of the biggest law libraries in Asia with about 80,000 titles in law and allied subjects. It is completely automated with Libsys 10 Software. All digital collection is freely accessible by DSPACE Software through ILI Website. The Institute also signed MoU with National Digital Library of India for access of ILI digital collection through NDLI. The Institute conducted online /hybrid teaching using Cisco Webex platform. The Institute has also provided various research softwares and plagiarism testing softwares for promoting ethical legal research.

Student Support and Progression

ILI recognizes that students need constant support and mentoring and hence, has devised a mechanism which involves faculty and student peer group involvement. The institute website provides all information to the students as well as to their. The institute provide all research resources and ICT support to the students.
